Vocational Education and Training (VET)

VET is an exciting option for students' Stage 6 pattern of study!

WHAT IS VET?

Vocational Education and Training or 'VET' courses allow students to engage with specific areas of interest, whilst undertaking a nationally recognised qualification as part of their HSC. VET courses enable students to gain industry relevant skills, as well as assist them to be work-ready by developing employability skills such as collaboration, communication, problem-solving, flexibility and time management. The role of VET in helping students prepare for further education, training, employment and lifelong learning is widely recognised by key stakeholders in education and industry.

HOW ARE VET COURSES DIFFERENT TO OTHER HSC COURSES?

For Year 11-12 students in NSW, VET is 'dual accredited': that is, students receive recognition towards their school qualification (their Record of School Achievement or HSC), as well as a nationally recognised VET qualification (Certificate or Statement of Attainment).

VET courses are competency-based – that means students are required to demonstrate their knowledge and skills gained. Rather than getting a grade as for other HSC subjects, students are considered competent or not yet competent for each unit undertaken. Students can attempt a competency more than once, but it is important that they give it a serious attempt!

Some VET courses have an HSC exam which provides the opportunity for students to have this HSC examination mark contribute towards their Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) calculation. The HSC Examination is OPTIONAL for VET courses and counts for 100% of the HSC course mark. Only students wanting to use their course for the ATAR calculation need to sit the HSC exam.

VET COURSES AT SPCC

VET COURSES AT EXTERNAL REGISTERED TRAINING ORGANISATIONS (RTO)

Some students may elect to complete an external VET course in a specific area of interest. These are generally delivered by TAFE or a private RTO. External VET courses undertaken by students in previous years include Animal Studies, Electrotechnology, Fitness, Beauty Services, Hairdressing, Engineering, Aeroskills, Applied Fashion and Design, and Information and Digital Technologies.

Completing an external VET course is a privilege. You will need to submit an expression of interest and possibly have an interview to explain your interest in the course, as well as how you are going to manage your studies. You need to show a high level of responsibility when attending external VET courses, as you need to make your own way to the course and take responsibility for your learning.

SCHOOL-BASED APPRENTICESHIPS AND TRAINEESHIPS (SBA/Ts)

Some students may elect to complete a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SBA/T) as part of their pattern of study. SBA/Ts are more than just part-time jobs. They are a great way for students to set themselves up for the career they want while completing their HSC. Opportunities are available across a wide range of occupations.

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) has responsibility for developing/endorsing curriculum to provide for apprenticeship and traineeship pathways within the HSC. Students undertaking an SBA/T have the opportunity to achieve a nationally-recognised VET qualification as well as their HSC, and gain valuable work skills and experience through paid employment.

Mr van der Velde is the school contact for SBA/Ts. If you are interested in undertaking a school-based traineeship or apprenticeship, it is important to see Mr van der Velde early! There is quite a process involved as it is a highly regulated system. The first steps for establishing an SBA/T are to have a willing employer and an RTO to deliver the formal training.

ADDITIONAL COURSE COSTS FOR VET COURSES

There are additional costs for some VET courses relating to the course cost (for external VET courses) or for uniforms, a First Aid Certificate or White Card. For more information, please see the Guidelines for Students Studying External VET Courses.

HOW CAN YOU SUCCEED IN VET COURSES?

- Attend all your VET classes.
- Complete all assessments and achieve all competencies.
- Communicate with your teacher when you need help to achieve a competency.
- Show diligent and sustained effort with all course work and assessments.
- Complete and learn from your work placement. For many courses, work placement is compulsory.

- If you have a specific area of interest, see Mrs Huen in the VET Office to see what courses are available – not all VET courses are available to school students.

HSC Examination

Entertainment Industry, Hospitality, Construction and *Business Services* are Industry Curriculum Framework courses and have an external written Higher School Certificate examination. This examination is optional for non-ATAR students.

Work Placement

Work placement is a mandatory HSC requirement for *Entertainment Industry, Hospitality, Construction* and *Business Services*. Students must complete 70 hours of workplace training in an industry related environment. In some circumstances, students' part-time work in an appropriate workplace may be used to fulfill work placement requirements.

Non-ATAR University Entry

Some universities will allow students to use a completed Certificate III for university admission. The University of Newcastle will award students a 67 selection rank for a completed Certificate III level qualification.
